









41% adult new HIV infections occur among Adolescents and Young People (15-24years)





GOAL

To provide comprehensive HIV prevention, treatment, care and support towards Universal Health Coverage for all people in Kenya



#### **OBJECTIVES**

- Reduce new HIV infections by 75%
- Reduce AIDS-related mortality by 50%
- Micro-eliminate viral hepatitis and reduce the incidence of sexually transmitted infections
- Reduce HIV related stigma and discrimination to less than 25%
- Increase domestic financing for the HIV response to 50%













### Treatment outcomes 95 95 95 Cascade with Gaps






AIDS-related deaths increased across 35 counties, in six counties (Samburu, Isiolo, Turkana, Lamu, Wajir, and Vihiga) the estimated number of AIDS-related deaths increased by more than 50% in 2021 as compared to 2022. In Samburu County, the number of AIDS-related deaths increased nearly 3-fold

An estimated 883, 694 of the 1.4 million people living with HIV aged between 35 and 74 years, many of them diagnosed in their younger years


# Demand Generation for new products remains sub-optimal.....

Uptake of pre-exposure prophylaxis among discordant couples





#### ADOLESCENTS AGED 10-19 ACCOUNT FOR:





# IMPLEMENTING LOCAL INNOVATIONS SUSTAINED THROUGH ENTERPRISE NETWORKS (LISTEN) IN KENYA

Strengthen community-led efforts for HIV prevention, care and treatment

- Strengthen technical capacities and leadership for sustained and scaled community-led interventions ( Human Centered Design) in HIV response.
- 2. Utilise the LISTEN model as a structured approach to sustain platforms for scaling up community-led solutions for the HIV response
- 3. Sustain an enabling environment between duty-bearers and empowered communities to **implement community-driven** collective actions for HIV prevention, treatment, and support

# LISTEN was introduced as a 5-year project in April of 2018 modeled in two devolved governance units (Kiambu and Homabay





# Homabay County has the highest HIV prevalence. The epidemic is generalized –mostly rural populations






### 21% of antenatal clients in Homabay County are adolescents aged 10-19







### **Capacity Development for Application of Human Centered Design**

- 195 staff trained on the Human-Centered design approaches at the national and sub-national levels
- 80 Community level personnel trained as champions for the application of the HCD model.
- HCD training resources adopted for capacity development approach in other projects funded by the Government of Kenya and the Global Fund for HIV, Tuberculosis, and Malaria







# LISTEN model is an efficient model for sustaining community-led solutions in the HIV if linkages are maintained

- ✓ Horizontal linkages are critical
- ✓ Economic empowerment —Groups are pre-occupied with incomegenerating activities
- ✓ Health insurance
- ✓ Require LISTEN champions across multiple –government agencies
- ✓ Support collaborative interventions such as water and sanitation, Tree Planting, table banking through horizontal linkages

## Sustainable platforms for Community-led solutions -Vertical and Horizontal linkages –Case of Kiambu County

- ✓ Ministry of Interior and Government coordination partner to sensitize 1,806 commercial motorbike rider riders on road safety -January 2022-February 2023,
- ✓ The Community of Practice members establish a savings association members established a <u>Savings and Credit Cooperative Society (SACCO)</u>
- ✓ Over 2,200 linked to microfinance and 1,200 licensed.





- "We started by saving Ksh 50 a day excluding Sundays, coming to Ksh 300 per week. That money has enabled us to own our land," noted the group's chairman, Lawrence Kariuki.
- Each member faithfully set aside Ksh 50 six days a week towards the project, enabling their <u>Savings</u> and <u>Credit Cooperative Society</u> (<u>SACCO</u>) to achieve the milestone.
- According to the Kenya Property Centre, an acre of land in Ruiru is worth about Ksh 8.5 million making 5 acres to cost Ksh42.5 million
- In the ceremony that was graced by Ruiru Member of Parliament Simon Ng'ang'a King'ara, the group motivated other boda boda riders to follow their lead



### **Key Lessons**

- 1. Leadership and Governance: Invest in CPs that include both senior and midlevel personnel to mitigate resilience during staffing transitions
- 2. Invest in simplified tools for documentation of results –
- 3. Horizontal linkages: Facilitate knowledge transfer between communities of practice Boda Boda to Fisherfolk
- **4. Support CPs to conduct partner mapping to minimize d**uplication of efforts and for efficiency gans

# Systemize the use of simplified tools to collate qualitative and quantitative data from Communities of Practice –Example of demand generation interventions

- 24,786 Sensitized on sexual reproductive health,
- 14,384 sensitized on stigma and discrimination,
- 17,668 provided with HIV treatment literacy education
- 20,920 sensitized on mental health.
- 21,301 reached with one on one and HIV prevention messages
- 13,244 were provided with NCD information,

#### **Outreach services Offered**

- 1,086 self-test kits
- 650 men mobilized and accessed VMMC
- 4,783 referred, and 1,143 screened for NCDS
- 8,419 referred for HTS and 2,334 tested.
- **5,423** referred for STI screening and 1,232 were screened.





### Sustaining LISTEN model in Kenya

- 1. The need for continued efforts to mobilise resources to leverage on the infrastructure of Communities of Practice in the two geographical locations-
- 2. Mainstream and bring to SCALE LISTEN as a Government approach to sustained community led solutions in the health sector: NSDCC committed \$260,000 to implement LISTEN 11 Arid and Semi-Arid sub-national government areas in the FY 2021/2022
- 3. Utilise the CPs infrastructure for other partnerships such as Global Fund for HIV, TB and Malaria and PEPFAR partners
- **4. Document, Disseminate results and build capacities in other sectors** partners to support the already such transport, security, metrology, finance institutions for the implementation of non-health CP priorities.
